Work Experince at WS

Introduce yourself and your background... Hi, I'm Emily, and I'm a vet student from the UK.

I grew up around horses, even though my family doesn't really have a horsey background (they have transformed into the best Pony Club parents over the years). I've regularly ridden eventers and hunters, but had never been involved with racing until my gap year in 2019/2020 where I decided to come out to NZ.

A racing contact who I knew through the PC kindly got me in touch with Jamie and Chanel Beatson at Ohukia Lodge, and I came out to do the R2R prep and sales for them in 2019/2020. I was really in at the deep end, but I had the best time and absolutely loved working with such incredible athletic horses. The industry had me hooked, and I learnt so much from the Beatson's, so I wanted to keep up with racing while I started vet school. They taught me everything I knew about racing and handling young stock, so I'm super grateful to them.

Since being at uni, I've also found a real interest and enthusiasm for stud work and foals, so I really wanted to build on my experience and come out to NZ again to chase the season (not just because of the Tank smoothies and amazing pies....)

Highlights from your work experience at WS?

This is a hard one, because I've loved my time at WS throughout the 3 weeks. There are the obvious highlights, such as welcoming some beautiful new foals into the world. I always find it pretty special watching them learn to stand, drink, and zoom around the paddock.

I've been pretty lucky with the weather too - the sunny and frosty mornings have been so beautiful.

Also, running the mares in at sunset has to be up there with a daily highlight.

Overall, there have been some challenging moments but working with the team to get a contracted foal right or treat a sick mare has been so rewarding. I feel so lucky to work with such knowledgeable and dedicated people who will go above and beyond to make sure the horses are as happy and healthy as possible. Also, the team have always found a way to be positive and crack a smile no matter how knackered we are, the positivity is definitely what I'll remember looking back on the trip.

Meeting Savabeel was also a huge moment for me, after working with so many of his incredible offspring at Ohukia Lodge.

We also of course, had some great social moments such as a mulled wine night at the white horse, and the rugby and racing night in Matamata – I'll be setting my alarm to watch I Wish I Win at home!!!

Favourite foal?

Again, really tough! I just love them all for so many reasons...

Cullemmy's Diamond, Celebrate, and Choux Mania all have a soft spot for me because each of them needed a little help early in life for one reason or another, so we spent a bit of quality time with them, and they all took it like absolute champs and were such bright little colts.

I also loved Maxamara's foal out of Noverre, who was a lovely-looking foal out of a beautiful mare with a nature to match. There were a lot of foals with great quality about them, and I wish I could list them all! ZaZa Gabour was another beautiful Noverre, Corvina with a cracking Super Seth, Candelabra, Façade, so many beautiful foals.

What did I think of New Zealand?

Living and then doing some travelling last time I was in NZ was so special, I fell in love with so many beautiful spots, also can't forget the lifestyle here and the people. I've had the pleasure of meeting such generous people who are up for a good laugh, with awesome can-do attitudes. I'm a huge lover of the outdoors and have really enjoyed revisiting Wairere Falls, Raglan, and Mount Maunganui.

Plans after WS?

Planning on completing an internship, which would either be in the UK or somewhere like New Zealand or Aus. I'm always keen to keep building on the connections I've made with those abroad, and racing has helped me make some incredible friends in Germany, Ireland, NZ, etc., which of

I hadn't done much foaling before being at the stud, and by the end, I felt so much more confident with the daily routine and the foaling process. We had great numbers of foals coming through, so it meant there were so many opportunities for me to be hands-on. They never made me feel like anything was a silly question and were really encouraging throughout.

Waikato Stud has a global reputation for brilliance, and you could really see that when working within the organised teams in such a beautiful setting.

Mark was also incredible in sharing his tips and tricks, and it was great to see experience, particularly with the foals and learn all about the history of the horses and their success.

Any advice for someone keen on the thoroughbred industry?

Don't be intimidated by what you think you don't know, because there is always someone out there who will be willing to teach. Get stuck in, do your best, and ask heaps of questions, and you'll get exactly where you need to be! I've learnt so much in NZ from pushing myself outside my comfort zone, and it's been challenging but so rewarding. I can't thank everyone along the way enough for the amount of support and guidance, as well as laughs, that they've given me. I'm leaving with heaps of enthusiasm and an even greater love of stud work and racing.
