

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A day to remember


7. Anything you want to add or mention?


I think I need to trade in my 2019 Mustang for Ford F-250 though. Or at least a ranger?

His last twelve months added to his NZ stakes, total of \$10.7m Aus dollars. Peter Moody will not overtax him, he could be around another couple of years yet, incidentally, he is now the ninth-highest Australasian stakes winner, not bad for an unsaleable yearling.
