
Ocean Park's early season winners

Spring, what a wonderful time of the year. Sure, the weather is inconsistent—cold mornings, the odd heavy downpour, days lengthening, sunshine. It happens every year, regardless of the doomsayers of climate change. Each component of the above plays its part in our endeavors, as spring applies to all mankind. Townies watch the days draw out, anticipating days at the beach, while those of us on the land find that spring reignites our annual round of planting, lambing, calving, and foaling, all in preparation for the next spring. At my age, it seems to come around increasingly quicker. It may be corny to say we wouldn't have it any other way, but clearly, it's not a choice. Despite the excitement of seeing the results of the previous year's efforts, it only confirms that another year has passed.

When we consider the components of spring, we learn over the years that each part of wellplanned nature plays a role. The crisp frost undoubtedly removes many of the impediments that affect our animals' wellbeing, and rainfall, though annoying, establishes our water table to sustain our feed through the summers. Longer days play such an important part in our breeding cycle. In recent years, attempts to interfere with nature's cycle by putting our mares under lights, hoping to produce an August foal, have shown limited advantages over the mare's lifetime. The most important component is, without a doubt, sunshine. We all feel better with the sun on our backs, and more importantly, our natural supply of nutrients—grass—which sustains most of New Zealand's animals, benefits. The protein levels rise, the supply increases, and these two measures alone contribute more to our endeavors than anything else we can do.

We are foaling. The mare's gestation of roughly 345 days means they inevitably conceive later and later until a year off becomes unavoidable. However, the excitement of starting another cycle after 50 years of effort still motivates Mary and me. We still breed around 15 mares a year. What do I mean by 'around'? Well, there will be a difficult foaling or some impediment that means the odd mare deserves a rest.

So, what's the point of this Corner? We have just added to the broodmare band. We purchased a mare we sold as a yearling. She has a two and three-year-old about to race, is a half-sister to a triple Group One winner, a half-sister to the dam of an Oaks winner, and the dam of a multiple Group Three winner. If that's not enough to whet your appetite, she is due to foal to Savabeel in three weeks.

You may well ask if my optimism outweighs my judgment at my age. Maybe, but I remind my aging friends how lucky we are to participate in our sport of kings until we can no longer. Magic Dancer, Noverre's dam, produced a superb full sister this week. We await Bonneval and The Real Beel among our handful this spring.

Bearing in mind that we rarely race at two, we are confident this year's foals will be part of our enjoyment in three years' time. Investing in stallions requires even more optimism—after all, an investment now is unlikely to be put to use until 2025, so it may be five years before it's proven or not. Stallion investment, therefore, is not on my list. We have involvement in Noverre, Savabeel, Ocean Park, Ardrossan, and Super Seth, who will meet the needs of our mares. It's hard to maintain sire strength, but these five have done nothing to dampen Waikato Stud's reputation.

Fifty years is a fair effort in any profession. The next ten won't affect our reputation, but we have the people, horses, foals, and upcoming races to look forward to. You should too.

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
