

The years come and go. I should know, having celebrated 80 years of inhabiting this earth. However, this is not about me. No, the Corner is about celebrating a racing year passed, a summary of our year's results.

We have a great deal to be proud of. The receipt of all three stallion awards by Savabeel confirms his place in the annals of NZ breeding history. Yes, the Grosvenor award did not grace our mantelpiece last year, and congratulations to the recipient. However, it is the Centaine award that we aspire to. This award measures the international achievements of our sire, which should be the aspiration of those of us standing stallions.

I am researching the number of individual Group One winners we have been fortunate enough to breed. However, in the meantime, let's just reflect on the past year. My research suggests only one well-known Australasian stud has bred

more Group One winners than Waikato. Coming first is great, but coming second confirms just how difficult it is to breed Group One winners. Three doesn't sound like a lot until you realise we sit isolated with this accolade.

We occasionally hear, "Well, it's easy. You have more mares, you have a champion sire." And yes, we do. Comparative commentary leads to all sorts of debate, so I will just say on our behalf that our sense of achievement and enjoyment, resulting from the confirmation that we are doing something right, is enough.

The ability to source sire prospects is definitely becoming increasingly difficult. I challenged a well-known Irishman visiting to nominate, at the season's close today, the three-year-old sire prospects in Australia. He could think of four. When you consider there are 8,000 colts of that age in Australasia, he may be a little harsh, and I am sure there will be those colts given a chance that will surprise us. We at Waikato have to fend off the argument that we are lucky with our sire selection. Our response: invest as much as we do, and it may improve your luck.


Which leads me to Super Seth. He has a long way to go, but his eight two-year-old winners topped off with two Stakes winners is as good a start as our previous boys have given us. Reports are more than encouraging; we are entitled to have a spring in our step.

Noverre has his first crop on the ground. Those of you who have seen him don't need me to tell you what a superb thoroughbred he is. Those of you with his first crop will know he has fulfilled his promise to date.

May all breeders celebrate our annual August 1st birthday and aspire to join us in breeding the best. Our 130 winners, 15 Stakes winners, and 3 Group One winners may not be achievable every year, but it may well be your year. If so, we will share your joy as you can share ours.
